
Dear Patrons.

When I was a boy, my mother took me to see a double bill including *The Return of the Magnificent Seven* followed by *The Magnificent Seven*. The fact that we saw the films in the wrong order was lost on me at the time, but the experience did introduce me to the idea of The Sequel. The successful secret of The Sequel should be that it is the same, but different. The same, in that it should engender a feel familiar to its predecessor, but still different enough, in terms of its plot and characters, to keep us entertained by its originality.

Caught In The Net is Ray Cooney's sequel to last year's opener Run For Your Wife. Set 16 years after the original, I believe that it is sufficiently different to keep you highly entertained for the next two hours, and very much hope that the audience response is the same as last year's, when I heard a lot of laughter and saw a lot of smiling faces. So enjoy the show and then come back to see the rest of what promises to be a thrilling season.

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
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#### Notes on the Author



#### Ray Cooney


Ray Cooney began his theatrical career as a boy actor in *Song of Norway* at the Palace Theatre in 1946. He served his apprenticeship by playing various repertory companies from Worthing to Blackburn before graduating to Brian Rix's company at the Whitehall Theatre in 1956. He later began a writing career which, to date, has produced 17 West End plays including *Not Now Darling*, *Move Over Mrs Markham*, *There Goes the Bride* (all cowritten with John Chapman), *Chase Me Comrade*, *Run For Your Wife*, *Out of Order*, *It Runs in the Family* and *Funny Money*.

As Producer and Director he has been responsible for over 30 London productions, including Lloyd George Knew My Father, Whose Life is it Anyway?, Chicago and Children of a Lesser God.

In 1983, Ray formed the Theatre of Comedy Company (bringing together the founder members consisting of 30 West End stars) and he became its first Artistic Director. During Ray's tenure the company produced over 20 plays including Run For Your Wife, Out of Order, Two into One and the acclaimed revivals of See How They Run, Loot, When We are Married and Pygmalion starring Peter O' Toole and the late John Thaw.

Today, Ray Cooney is recognized theatrically and publicly as 'the master of farce' and a most worthy successor, as an author, to the great Ben Travers, and as a director/actor to Brian Rix. his comedies and farces have been translated into more than 40 foreign languages including Chinese, Japanese and Russian. During his hectic theatrical career he has always found time to continue acting, and recently played in the last year of Run For Your Wife in London before appearing in the New York production.

Ray has been married to his wife, Linda for 35 years and has two sons, Danny and Michael. Michael has inherited his father's gift and also writes plays. Danny, his eldest son, lives in Australia with his wife and two children.

Everyone to do with this production has made him feel very welcome - but they'll soon learn the error of their ways. Hope you enjoy it Steve.


