

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
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Hiya Kids! (And Wrinkly Folk!),

I was three years old when my Mum and Dad first took me to see a pantomime.

It's where I learnt all the words to 'Chick Chick Chick Chick Chicken, Lay a Little Egg for Me,' which I believe may have contributed to my later interest in ornithology.

At some point during the proceedings, the curtain came down and everyone around me started to get up. I asked my Mum what they were doing and she told me that the pantomime was over and it was time to go home.

Despite being a writer I find it impossible to describe the utter desolation and emptiness I experienced. I'd been enthralled and couldn't believe it was over. Being three years old meant there were only two courses of action available - to shed tears of grief and refuse to leave my seat.

After being sedated I recovered well enough to demand an assurance that we would go to a pantomime every year – and from the age of four I was brought to the Southport Dramatic Club where I learnt everything I needed to know about the magic, music, mayhem and madness of panto. I'm delighted to have been asked to script this year's production of Aladdin.

British pantomime is unique, it's fun, it's silly, it appeals to all ages and just like new technology – it's designed to be interactive.

So don't be shy – Boo the Baddies, Groan at the Gags, Hum, Sing, Shout, Wave, Point and Laugh but more importantly – Don't Forget to Share Your Sweeties!


Sabrina Regazzoni Angelina Genie




