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


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Director's notes

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
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Robert Thomas

and died 1989 in Paris. At 14 he discovered his passion for contemporary theatre and went on to read all the plays published since 1900. At 20 he headed for the lights and theatres of Paris full of ambition for writing and perfoming.

He wrote a succession of plays and received as many refusal slips. He also appeared in numerous plays, augmenting his meagre income by working as a telegraph operator. Two plays, Eight Women and Madame Trait d'Union were staged in Nice in 1958 and 1959 but met with little success. He was, however, nothing if not tenacious, and in 1960 Trap For A Lonely Man was staged by a Parisian theatre, the Bouffes-Parisiens, and Thomas at last achieved his 'overnight success', winning the coveted Priz du Quai des Goldsmith. Translated into several languages, it won numerous awards.

Subsequently both his theatre and film work ran side by side for years and collaborated with names like Hitchcock, Darryl Zanuck, and others who converted several of his work on to film. Some interesting titles too - Bastards, and My Pastor the Nudist!?

From 1970 until his death he was director of The Theatre Edouard VII. In 1988 he was asked to summarize his life in one sentence by friends at a film festival, "I succeeded, I won a lot of money and I kept some. If a truck rolls over me at 60, I have shown them I have lived". He died a few months later.







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



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


- Should you arrive after the performance has started, you will be guided to your seats when a suitable opportunity occurs.


At least in this play there is only one wife, or is there? Ted hopes that you enjoy finding out.



Jamie Clark - The Police Inspector


Jamie is a new member of the SDC and is looking forward, very much, to participating in his first production at the Little Theatre.


Sandra Unsworth - The Woman

David Charters - The Tramp






Susanne Denner - The Nurse

When Ray, the director, asked for a nurse, he got one - literally, however Susanne hopes that the 'kiss of life' does not turn into the 'kiss of death'!








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
