
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# Director's Notes

here is always a danger when dramatising a play that is based upon a film, especially a fine and popular film like *The Graduate*, that the public will make comparisons that are uncomplimentary. The trick, I think, as a dramatist, is to change

the setting and, sometimes the mood, of the story just enough to make the play stand up on its own, without losing the essence of what the story is meant to convey. Terry Johnson's dramatisation has achieved this admirably and I was very excited, therefore, to be asked to direct it.

There is a similar danger, of course, faced by the actors who have been asked to portray characters

who have already been immortalised by great screen idols. However, I am delighted to report that my cast are a bolshie lot who, from day one, have shown themselves to be far too strong minded to become mere imitations of

those who precede them.

So you are free to make comparisons if you wish, but we don't care. One of the themes of the story is about people having the strength to make their own decisions. We have done that in this production – and had a lot of fun doing so.

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## **Charles Webb**

Different, eccentric, quirky, non conformist. Pick your own word of that ilk after reading a little about Charles Webb.

Webb has been with his partner Eve, who shaves her head and calls herself 'Fred' for more than 40 years, although they divorced years ago either in protest at the institution of marriage or against the US's lack of marriage rights for gays.

'Fred' was notorious for greeting people at the door naked!

Webb declined an inheritance from his father, a wealthy doctor. They also sold their wedding presents back to their guests and having given away four houses in succession lived on the breadline, taking such menial jobs as cleaners, cooks and fruit pickers, working at K-Mart and living in a shack.

See what I mean? Read on - and it's hereditary it seems!

They have two sons, one of whom is now a performance artist who once cooked and ate a copy of The Graduate – with cranberry sauce, of course.

They removed said son from school so that they could tutor them at home. This being an illegal act in California at the time, they fled the state to evade the authorities, going on to manage a nudist camp in New Jersey!

Different?

1963 saw the publication of Webb's first and most famous novel, apparently based on his own affair with an older, wealthy, beautiful and

married Pasadena socialite, which created quite a stir in conservative Pasadena.

Full of wry humour and understatement, it must surely have given the real life "Mrs Robinson" a permanent niche in American history as the archetypal seductive older woman.

In 1967 the novel was made into the hugely successful Mike Nichols film we're familiar with complete with Simon and Garfunkel's accompanying music.

Webb claimed he never felt comfortable with the attention the film brought him because he felt it distracted him from his status as a serious artist.

He sold the film rights for \$20,000!! And afterwards was rarely associated with the publicity or the growth of its reputation, the script writers, Buck and Willingham assuming most of the credit for the work.

The producer, Joseph E Levine later gave an additional \$10,000 – wow!

In later years it was reported Webb had written a sequal entitled "Home School" but publication was bedevilled with problems because of a copyright loophole after his sale of "The Graduate".

This apparently was resolved and he signed a publishing deal, just in time to save him from eviction from his home for non payment of rent.

He and Fred now live in Hove, East Sussex.

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# The History of The Graduate

The first and most successful novel of **Charles Webb** was written in 1963, being made into the hugely successful film in 1967 by **Mike Nicholls** starring **Anne Bancroft** and an unknown **Dustin Hoffman**.

Simon and Garfinkel supplied the title track Mrs Robinson.

It was adapted for the stage both on Broadway and the West End.

**Terry Johnson** directed his own adaptation of the novel for stage and it has been a considerable hit.

Both in London and Broadway Kathleen Turner originated the role of the seductive Mrs Robinson who sets her sights on the young college graduate, Benjamin Braddock played by Jason Biggs on Broadway and by Andrew Williams here in the UK.


The role of Mrs Robinson was later taken by **Glynis Barber** and has played many theatres including the Giegud, London and also Bradford, Bath, Wycombe, Glasgow, Newcastle and Cambridge.



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





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# **NOW IN REHEARSAL** The Winslow Boy

SDC's next production is Sir Terence Rattigan's spell-binding drama directed by Robin Hirsch.

On October 17th 1908 the Admiralty informed Mr. Archer-Shee that his son George had been found guilty of theft of a postal order at the Royal Naval College at Osborne.

Mr. Archer-Shee, however, was convinced of his son's innocence and began a fight to clear his family's name.

Thus started the famous court case that inspired Terrence Rattigan to write The Winslow Boy.

As the play makes clear, the point at issue was not who stole a postal order, but the individual's right to fight for justice when faced with the apparently arbitrary decision of bureaucratic authority.





# Benjamin's a little worried about his future!

- There was actually only 6 years difference in the age between **Anne Bancroft** and **Dustin Hoffman**, who was 29 at the time of filming but played a 21 year old.
- The leg in the film publicity poster belonged to former Miss Texas Linda Gray a.k.a. Sue-Ellen in the long running TV soap "Dallas".
- The film was nominated for a total of seven Academy Awards, but one won only one Best Director.
- Warren Beatty, Charles Grogin, Robert Redford and Burt Ward (who later became Robin in the Batman TV series and latterly a pornography "actor") were all considered for the role of Benjamin, with Patricia Neal, Candice Bergen and Doris Day considered for Mrs Robinson. Mike Nichols, the director, also approached Ava Gardner for the role.
- According to **Dustin Hoffman**, his friend and former room-mate **Gene Hackman** was cast as Mr Robinson but was fired after a few weeks of work.
- Ronald Regan was considered for the role of Mr Braddock,
- Paul Simon wrote 2 songs for the film that Mike Nichols rejected Punky's Dilemma and A Hazy Shade of Winter, but they later appeared in Simon & Garfunkels Book Ends album. Mrs Robinson originally Mrs Roosevelt was not written for the film but was re-named and used.
- The red Italian sports car used in the film is a 1966 Alfa Romeo Spider 1600 also known as the Duetto.
- When Dustin Hoffman showed up at Joseph E Levine's office for a casting interview the producer mistook him for a window cleaner, so Hoffman, in character, cleaned a window.
- In Hoffman & Bancroft's first bedroom scene Hoffman, off script, grabbed Bancroft's breast, deciding it was an awkward schoolboy ploy, and then walked away from camera, banging his head on the wall to stop laughing. Mike Nicholls thought it so hilarious he left it in.
- In 2007 the American Film Institute ranked this as the 17<sup>th</sup> Greatest Movie of All time, and the film's line "Mrs Robinson, you're trying to seduce me, aren't you?" as the 63<sup>rd</sup> greatest film quote.
