



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


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Director's notes

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Alistair Hewitt

Alistair Hewitt began his writing career in earnest in 1999, when he took an M.A. in 'Writing for Film and Television' at Sheffield University, where his personal tutor was the late, great Jack Rosenthal.

Realising that there was little chance of getting a film script produced, he quickly turned to writing plays that he could direct and produce himself. His first adult play was *Spending Frank*, a story about a woman's desperate desire to have a child. Written for SDC friends past and present, it was first performed at the Unity Theatre in Liverpool. A

re-written version of the play was later produced professionally at the Stephen Joseph Theatre, Scarborough, to some acclaim, and later by Borderline Theatre in Scotland, where it enjoyed a month long tour.

In 2008 Alistair wrote a community play, *Tales From the Melling Road*, for Liverpool's European Year of Culture and a second production followed, performed by the SDC Youth Theatre.

The Dangers of Tobacco was originally written for the SDC out of season bar

production in 2009. Now he is delighted to be able to put the play on to the main stage. The version you will see tonight is updated from the original, but has most of the same cast.

Alistair has been a member of the SDC since 1989. He has acted in and directed many plays in this time and is very honoured to have been chosen as the next chairman of the club.

Alistair is Assistant Headteacher/Director of Performing Arts at Maghull High School, where he has worked for 24 years.

A look at The Dangers of Tobacco

THE Dangers of Tobacco is a comedy, not about smoking, but about relationships. It revolves around three sisters and one man, Rory Tobacco. It was first staged as a Bar/Studio production in the Little Theatre Bar in May 2009 by the Southport Dramatic Club.

The action takes place on a summer's day in the conservatory of Marie, who is the eldest of the three sisters. The play opens with Marie and Cissie (another one of the sisters) talking about Rory and we learn that Marie is divorced from Rory. Both sisters have had a 'phone call from Eva, the youngest sister, insisting they meet at Marie's.

Marie provides a lot of the laughs in the play and the playwright, Alistair Hewitt, uses malapropisms in Marie's speech as a way of introducing the comedy: for example she says, "I would not have attended a single one of his tediously sycofranco dinners."

Cissie is very confident and we learn that she has had a lot of boyfriends. Eva, who is a local councillor, and bossy, is less experienced with men than Cissie and Cissie likes to make fun of her because of this.


Rory Tobacco does not make his first appearance into the action until almost half way through the play, and by then the audience knows a lot about him. They know he is a local businessman and involved with the Chamber of Commerce, the Round Table and the Town's Mens' Guild.

As Marie, Cissie and Eva are sisters they can speak their minds and Alistair Hewitt in the programme for the original 2009 production wrote that he chose sisters as he thought this might make for good drama.

Although The Dangers of Tobacco is a comedy, there are serious and thoughtprovoking moments as well.

At the end of the play will the three sisters still be talking and what will be the fate of Rory Tobacco?

The Guild consists of a group of one hundred and four prestigious theatre companies, all of which have sole control over their theatres. We are delighted that Southport Dramatic Club will be hosting this event in this our seventy - fifth anniversary year. The S.D.C. joined the L.T.G. in 1967. Then, as a young, mini skirted, member, I was asked by those who were organising the event, to help. I did so and, since then, I have been heavily involved in the Guild, organising subsequent conferences and being National Chairman of the Guild in the nineties.

The Guild's Patron is the charismatic, superb actor, Sir Ian McKellan. He is very involved with the Guild's activities and visits our theatres whenever his international commitments permit. At present, he is working in New Zealand so he will skype or record a message to the delegates here in Southport. I was

fortunate to be the first person during Sir Ian's patronage to be made an Honorary Associate of the Guild.

Many famous actors and directors started their careers on the amateur stage, for example: Sir Ian at Bolton, Mandy Richardson, here. At National Conferences (which occur annually) a programme of workshops and lectures is provided by the host theatre which are conducted by a range of well-known experts. We shall also be welcoming the President of the Southport Dramatic Club, Ian Judge, who is currently directing opera in Hollywood, and will be a guest speaker. As well as the



workshops, our conference programme will include a presentation by our Youth Theatre members and we are proud that the production which the delegates will attend on the Saturday evening, "The Dangers of Tobacco", is written by our Vice Chairman, Alistair Hewitt.
