

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



# J.B. Priestley

John Boynton Priestley was born on September 13, 1894 in a suburb of Bradford.

His father was a schoolmaster, and sadly his mother died when he was two. He left school at 16 to work in a wool office, and during this period Priestley began to write and had a column in the *Bradford Pioneer*, a local periodical. This work was unpaid.

In September 1914, at the start of World War I, he joined the Army. He writes about his time in the Army in his autobiography, *Margin Released*. In the book, the British Army and the officer class are heavily criticised.

After the war, Priestley was educated at Trinity Hall, Cambridge. He achieved his first big success with The Good Companions in 1929, which was his fourth novel. In 1930 he published Angel Pavement and it was also popular. The popularity of these two books enabled Priestley to begin to write for the theatre. His first solo play was Dangerous Corner (1932).

At the time of World War II, he was a broadcaster on



the BBC. His broadcast was called *The Postcript* and went out weekly in 1940 and 1941. At its most popular, sixteen million were listening. During the broadcast, Priestley would talk about wartime conditions. In the end they were stopped because they were seen to be critical of the Government.

In 1945, he wrote An Inspector Calls, which is his most famous play, and the playwright was considered to be now at the height of his powers.

After the war, Priestley's plays included *The Linden Tree* (1945) and he worked with Iris Murdoch adopting her book *A Severed Head* (1963) for the stage. He

also wrote essays and a number of volumes of autobiography during this time.

In 1958 he became one of the people to start the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament.

Priestley was given an honorary Doctor of Letters by The University of Bradford in 1970 and in 1973 he was awarded a freeman of the City of Bradford. He was given both a knighthood and peerage, but rejected both honours, although, he did accept an Order of Merit from the Queen in 1977.

He died in 1984 aged 89.

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# Dangerous Corner

Dangerous Corner was written in 1932 and was J.B Priestley's first play.

He was 38 at the time and he said he wanted, "to prove that a man might produce long novels and yet be able to write effectively, using the strictest economy, for the stage."

The play premiered on May 17th 1932 at The Lyric Theatre in London's West End and was produced by Tyrone Guthrie. It received poor reviews on its release and ran for six months, but it became a worldwide hit for him. It opened on Broadway at The Empire Theatre on October 27, 1932, and had a run of two hundred and six

performances. In the cast were: Colin Keith-Johnston, Jean Dixon, Stanley Ridges and Barbara Robbins.

A film version of the play was released in 1934 and was directed by Phil Rosen and starred: Virginia Bruce, Conrad Nagel and Melvyn Douglas.

Dangerous Corner is part of Priestley's 'Time' plays, which explore the ideas of J.W Dunne. Some of his other 'Time' plays are I Have Been Here Before (1937), Time and the Conways (1937), and An Inspector Calls (1945). J.W Dunne was an Anglo-Irish aeronautical engineer, and wrote a number of books looking into the question of

time. His work also influenced Aldous Huxley. In Priestley's 'Time' plays, Priestley looks at numerous concepts of time. The concept has an effect on the different people in the plays.

As the story unfolds in Dangerous Corner, the audience finds out a number of revelations about the characters. The setting for the play is 1934 in the drawing room of Robert and Freda Caplan's House at Chantbury Close. The Caplans are hosting Freda's brother and sisterin-law, Olwen Peel and Charles Stanton. As soon as Robert quizzes people about his brother Martin's suicide, the revelations start.....

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# Synopsis of Scenes


The action takes place after dinner in the Drawing Room of the Caplan's house at Chantbury Close.

# The Radio Times "the offical organ of the BBC"

On 28th September 1923 the Radio Times first appeared on newspaper stands. It was produced as a joint venture between the BBC and a commercial Publisher. In 1925 the BBC took over the Editorial control. As early as 1928 Radio Times announced a regular series of 'experimental television transmissions by the Baird process' for half an hour each morning. 1936 saw the start of the first 405-line high-definition service making the Radio Times the world's first television listings magazine. By 1937 the entire Radio Times operation had moved in-house where it has remained ever since.

With the outbreak of war in 1939 all television broadcasting was halted in order to prevent enemy aircraft from using its signal as a directional beacon. The nation was once more reliant on radio and the only wartime station was The Home Service. Throughout the war years the Radio Times never missed an edition although by 1944 with paper rationing the magazine had reduced to 20 pages of tiny type on thin paper.

The post-war period saw an expansion in broadcasting with the introduction of the Light Programme, the Third Programme and the return of television. By the early 50's television was recognised as the media of the future and the television listings were integrated with the radio listings. 1955 saw the debut of ITV and with it the competition of other listings magazines – TV Times, Viewer and Look



Westward. However by 1968 TV Times was the only listings title for ITV. This meant that the only way to have both BBC and ITV listings was to buy the two magazines.

BBC2 commenced transmitting in 1964 and in 1967 BBC 2 became Britain's first colour television channel. At this time colour annotations first appeared alongside of listings in the Radio Times.

In 1988 the magazine featured in the Guinness Book of Records at which time the Christmas Edition sold 11,220,666 copies making it the best selling edition of any British magazine in history. The Broadcasting Act of 1990 granted newspapers the right to publish weekly listings which had previously been exclusive to BBC and ITV. Since 1991 Radio Times has faced stiff competition but remains the most comprehensive and authoritative guide on offer. It has proved to be a powerful promotional tool for the publication of both television and radio shows and is still to be found holding its own on the newspaper stands of today.
