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John Morley

John Austin Morley, who adapted the story of Goldilocks and the Three Bears into a pantomime, was born in Birmingham on December 13, 1924. Morley's father was a wealthy businessman and, as a child, John loved to look at picture books.

The first pantomime he went to see was at the old Prince of Wales Theatre in Birmingham. His love of the theatre was supported by his uncle who bought him a toy stage.

Morley went to school at Uppingham before studying at St John's College, Cambridge. At University he was a member of the Cambridge Footlights. The writer joined the forces during the Second World War and was a member of the Coldstream Guards. In 1943 Morley secured a double by becoming an officer and having his first panto (*Dick Whittington*) performed by his regiment. After the war he became a gagman and cowriter at the London Palladium for their 1946 panto *Puss in Boots*.

During the 1960s Morley made pantomimes with the Howard and Wyndham company in Scotland. When he returned to London, he wrote for the likes of Les Dawson and Danny La Rue. Morley did not only write for the theatre he also contributed to television

programmes such as The Basil Brush Show. The writer however preferred working at the Small Players Theatre in London. There he helped put on and script fifty four Victorian-style pantomimes. Morley would describe himself as a 'panto-scriptwriter', and he wrote over two hundred and fifty pantomime scripts, including Goldilocks and the Three Bears. His adaptations are always faithful to the fairy tales and do not waver much from the originals. He is also remembered as a showbusiness encyclopaedist because of his knowledge of all pantomimes.

Morley died in Brighton on July 16, 1994.





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A History of Modern Pantomime

Today pantomime is for many a part of the Christmas celebrations.

Theatres, both professional and amateur, perform pantos during December and January and both young and old come to see them. It is believed that the modern pantomime is linked to *Commedia dell'arte*, which was a form of theatre in Italy in the 16th century. In each story there were dance, tumbling, music, acrobatics and buffoonery, which are often found in modern pantomimes.

Pantomime first became popular in this country at the beginning of the eighteenth century. In England, characters from *Commedia dell'arte* were used in a form


of early pantomime called 'Harlequinade.'

The Theatre Royal, in Drury Lane, staged Jack the Giant Killer in 1773, which is the first pantomime story that has a link to today's shows. During the Victorian era the pantomime developed to look like the shows seen today. The Harlequinades became less popular, and pantomimes like Cinderella and Jack and the Beanstalk could be seen. H.J Byron and J.R Planche wrote the pantomimes during this period, and they introduced puns and word plays into the shows, which are still popular today.

As the pantomimes became more popular, the scene changes became more

spectacular and the costumes more beautiful. Some of the most lavish pantomimes could be seen at Drury Lane Theatre in London. Those attending the shows could expect to see Pantomime Dames and Principal Boys. The pantomimes began to be linked to Christmas and were written to appeal to children. They also began to open on Boxing Day and often had two performances on that day.

Modern pantomimes are still aimed at children. Their titles include *Goldilocks and the Three Bears, Cinderella* and *Peter Pan*. Celebrities from film and television also feature in shows at the bigger theatres.
