Originally entitled 'Threes', the plot of 'Company' revolves around Bobby, a single man unable to commit fully to a steady relationship, let alone marriage.

As he approaches his thirty-fifth birthday he visits the five married couples who are his best friends and they share with him their views on relationships, whether Bobby wants to hear them or not.

Unlike most musical plays, which follow a clearly delineated plot, 'Company' is a concept musical composed of short vignettes, presented in no particular chronological order, linked by Bobby's upcoming birthday celebrations.

First performed in 1970, The production was among the first to deal with adult themes and relationships. As Sondheim himself put it, "Company deals with upper-middle-class people with upper-middle-class problems. Broadway theatre has been for many years supported by those people. They really want to escape, and here we're saying we'll bring it right back in their faces ... what they came to a musical to avoid, they suddenly find facing them on the stage."

It was nominated for a record-making fourteen Tony Awards and won six.

On a personal note, I would like to dedicate this production to my father, who has always encouraged me to be the best I can be.




