#### PRODUCER'S NOTE.

In presenting "The Trojan Woman" of Euripides we are breaking new ground for the Southport Dramatic Club. An interesting example of Greek drama and the beginnings of the Theatre as we know it to-day, it has at the same time, a universal appeal owing to the almost incredible modernity both of its theme and outlook, and the translator Professor Gilbert Murray describes it as a work of "quite extraordinary genius two or three thousand years before its time."

First acted in 415 B.C. the play is an intense study of the tragedy of the aftermath of war seen through the eyes of the wives, sisters and daughters of the defeated. We see Hecuba bereft of husband, children and hope and destined to become the slave of Odysseus; we see Cassandra "by the breath of God made wild" torn from her temple where she was the chaste priestess to Apollo and carried off to be the bride of Agamemnon; and we see the gentle Andromache parted from her child and forced to wed with Pyrrhus, Achilles' son; and surrounding them a chorus of women in the Grecian tradition "nameless and barely articulate, mere half-heard voices of an eternal sorrow." Having passed through hatred, fear and despair, we see the women finally arrive when all fears of a possible worse fate are past, at a state of peace and even of glory, while conquest turns to dust in the mouths of the conquerers and the victory which they thought would bring only joy, brings instead great misery.

The play is presented almost in its entirety and the cast has been chosen mainly from those members who have been attending classes during the season. The production may therefore be regarded as an indication of the talent and enthusiasm which exists among those members, some of whom have had little experience, all of whom are deeply interested in the theatre and many of whom will some day carry the responsibility for maintaining the high standard the Southport Dramatic Club sets out to achieve.
