




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KINGSWOOD SCHOOL

THE WIT AND WISDOM OF OSCAR WILDE

Oscar Wilde was a sparkling and beguiling conversationalist. The words spoken by the characters he created in his writings are, like his own, gloriously whimsical and witty. Glowing within them are truths - everlasting, often paradoxical truths - that sprung from his understanding of the humour and contrariness of life.

But it is through the medium of the theatre that Wilde's genius is fully realised. In 1892 his first play, "Lady Windermere's Fan" was staged. In the following three years his fame and fortune reached its zenith with the hugely popular and successful productions of "A Woman of No Importance": "An Ideal Husband": and his masterpiece "The Importance of Being Earnest".

Reflecting upon himself, Oscar Wilde said to his friend André Gide, "I put my genius into my life; all I've put into my works is talent".

The great and unique genius of Wilde was his ability to perceive and present both sides of an argument at the same time.

Characteristically, he provided a summary of his own greatness: "I awoke the imagination of my century so that it created myth and legend about me. I summed up all systems in a phrase, and all existence in an epigram".

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
