




William Nicholson

William Nicholson was born in 1948 and is reported as saying that his favourite book as a child was "Just William" but that what really inspired him to become a writer were Ian Fleming's James Bond stories. He married Virginia in 1988 and they have 3 children.

William Nicholson was a director during the mid-1970s to mid-1980s, during which time he directed over 50 documentaries for the BBC.

He is also well known as the author of "Shadowlands", which tells the story of C S Lewis and his love affair with Joy Gresham. This was adapted into a screenplay and taken to the big screen in 1993 by Sir Richard Attenborough. Anthony Hopkins and Debra Winger starred as the two lovers. It had previously been made into a television film by the BBC in 1985, after its success both in London and on Broadway.

The effect on his creativity, of the diverse nature of William Nicholson's early influences, are illustrated by his choice in writing this account of the life of Katherine Howard.





Epilogue

Katherine & Jane Rochford were executed on February 13th 1542. Katherine was just 20 and had to be helped to the scaffold as she was almost too weak to walk to the block. Jane became excessively voluble and made a rambling confession which tried the patience of the large crowd which had gathered. Both died cleanly under the axe and were interred in the nearby chapel of St Peter ad Vincula.

Henry VIII lived on until 28th January 1547. His last wife, Catherine Parr, remarried shortly after his death and died in childbirth a year later.

Anne of Cleves lived in great comfort, principally at Hever Castle where she set up a minature Phenish court. She was not allowed to return to her homeland and died in 1557 after a long illness.

Thomas Culpeper was executed at Tyburn on 10th December 1540. His sentence of being hung, drawn and quartered was commuted "at the King's mercy", resulting in his being beheaded and his head displayed on Tower Bridge.

Thomas Howard, Earl of Norfolk. Following Katherine's execution, Norfolk's influence waned and he was forced back into the position of a mere Military Commander. In 1546 he and his son Henry Howard were charged with treason. Henry was executed but Norfolk was saved by the death of the King. A devout catholic he was released from prison in 1553 on the accession of the Catholic monarch, Mary 1st, and served her until his death a year later at the age of 81.

Thomas Cranmer. A strong supporter of the Reformation, Cranmer remained Archbishop of Canterbury during the rest of Henrys' reign. During the short life of Edward VI he shaped the doctrinal transformation of the Church of England and was responsible for much of the first Book of Common Prayer. He supported the claims of Lady Jane Grey after Edwards' death and upon the accession of Mary in 1553 he was tried for treason and convicted of heresy. A few days before his death in 1556, he recanted, but when asked to repeat his recantation at the stake, he refused and thrust the hand that had written it into the fire.

Thomas Wriothesley became a principal Secretary of State in 1540 and was made Lord Chancellor in 1544. He was one of the executors of Henry VIII's will. He supported the appointment of Edward Seymour as protector and was rewarded by being dismissed as chancellor. He was given the Earldom of Southampton and spent his last years helping to overthrow the protector and instate John Dudley in 1549. He died in 1550.
