

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DIRECTOR'S NOTES



Good evening and welcome to an intriguing evening.

As our previous play stated, nobody's perfect, yet here we have the perfect murder, committed by......well, you didn't think I was going to make it that easy for you, did you?

Suffice to say that, as the pieces of the jigsaw are revealed, you will end the evening with a different picture than you had at the beginning and I am not just referring to the change of setting during the interval!

Once again Syd Coley has risen to the challenge of providing the setting and Tony Berry and Chris Ratcliffe have been terrific in providing the lighting and sound effects required. The music, for those who do not recognise it, comes from Vivaldi's Four Seasons.

Rehearsals have been intriguing too, with the cast only getting together completely in mid-February, after a period of separate rehearsals for each element of the play.

The play spans the past and the future as it begins on 17th February this year and ends five months later as the murder trial concludes.

What were you doing on the evening of 17th February? You weren't in Pimlico by any chance? For your sake, I hope not....

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JEFFREY ARCHER

Jeffrey Archer was born in 1940 and educated at Wellington School and Brasenose College, Oxford. His father, William Archer, was a professional soldier and his mother, Lola Cook Archer, was a journalist. In 1969 he became the youngest member of the House of Commons, where he served until 1974. He was also a world class sprinter and represented Great Britain in international competition. He was appointed Deputy Chairman of the Conservative Party in 1985 and was elevated to the House of Lords in 1992.

Jeffrey Archer has lived all the lives of a very well bred and clever cat. When he faced financial ruin in 1974 and lost his entire fortune because of a bad investment, he took the lemon and made a frosty pitcher of sweet lemonade, splashing into the world of publishing with a best selling first novel, "Not a Penny More, Not a Penny Less", based on his financial downfall.

Public figures are regularly incorporated into his fiction, including Ted Kennedy (Shall We Tell the President?) and Saddam Hussein (Honour Among Thieves). In "The Fourth Estate", he turned media moguls Rupert Murdoch and the late Robert Maxwell into his main characters. Archer is a devotee of the theatre and was proud owner of the Playhouse in London. He has written two plays, "Exclusive" (1989) and "Beyond a Reasonable Doubt" (1987). Tonight's play "The Perfect Murder" is an adaptation by Hugh Janes of the novel of the same name.



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

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Douglas Carrick (Director)

For many years Douglas played leading parts in musicals with various societies in Glasgow, Maidenhead, High Wycombe and Southport. His favourite role was King Arthur in "Camelot". Alongside these glittering roles he was honing his skills in a variety of dramatic roles and he has appeared in several SDC productions including "The Forsyte Saga", "Separate Tables", "Someone Waiting", "Sweet Revenge", and last year, "Revenge". Most recently he appeared as Bishop Parry in "The Herbal Bed".



"Steel Magnolias", presented ten years ago, was Douglas' debut with the Little as a director. The directorial gap was partly down to an enforced absence from the stage due to demands of work, but he has also directed for Formby Little Theatre, where he presented an atmospheric "Dial M for Murder" last year.

The opening night of "The Perfect Murder" is a double event for him, as one of his one act plays, written under his pen name of David Welsh, has its first performance in Essex on the same evening.

Brian Bentley (John Hoskins) Brian's last appearance was as C. S. Lewis in "Shadowlands", a

far cry from tonight's offering. He was directed by and appeared with David Davies in "The Business of Murder" - habits die hard. Other roles include Ford in "The Merry Wives of Windsor" and Richard in "Hay Fever".

Margaret Hodge (Elizabeth Hoskins)

Margaret is delighted to be treading the boards at the Little again after a break of more than two years. Her last play was "Breezeblock Park" in 2000. During this period she has, however, been involved in some committee work and musical performances, notably "42nd Street" with Southport Amateur Operatic Society.





Hugh Wolfson (D.I. Simmons)

Hugh joined the SDC in 1984 and moved to Manchester in 1986. He appeared in "Ladies Who Lunch", "Toad of Toad Hall", "Pack of Lies" and "Shadowlands", and most recently "The Herbal Bed". He directed "Peggy for You".

Hugh is also a member of Altrincham Garrick.



Ron Wilson (Sgt. Davies/Clerk)

This is Ron's first outing for the SDC. He has appeared in numerous TV programmes including "Peak Practice" and the original "Crossroads". When not running his own sales and marketing company Ron enjoys snooker and fast cars. You can catch him later in the year in the SDC's production of "Loot".

Helene Porter (Maria Johnson/Judge)

In her second performance for the SDC, Helene is back to take on two very different characters in the "Perfect Murder". Last seen as Hester, the loyal servant in the "Herbal Bed", the SDC's second production this season.
