Directors notes

Some years ago a group from the S.D.C. went to see one of the first performances of Ronald Harwood's play 'The Dresser', starring Tom Courtenay and Freddie Jones at the Manchester's Royal Exchange. From that time on I was hooked on Harwood's work. Since then we have been able to produce his plays here at the Little Theatre:-

'The Dresser'- Directed by the late Don Anderson, featuring Brian Tooley and Bill Finn (now a possible choice here next season).

'Another Time'- Directed by the late Janine Grime, with Michael Yates as a classical pianist.

'After The Lions'- As an out of season bar production, directed by myself, with Pat Ball, Sheila Furlong, Hugh Wolfson and Craig Foster completing a small cast.

All the above mentioned plays carried a theatrical theme. A famous actor/manager and his personal dresser working in provincal theatres during the Second World War. The development of a young South African pianist into a world famous recording concert pianist. And Sarah Bernhardt's decision to have an amputation carried out by a surgeon at the battle front during the Great War.

Strong stuff, handled with humour and sympathy. Now my enthusiasm for the playwright's work has been increased as we go into 'Quartet'. A striking observation of a group of elderly people confronting their few years ahead by accepting their limited resources to display what they were once capable.
