

Royce Ryton's script enables us to glimpse behind the doors of Queen Mary's home at Marlborough House in the days leading up to Edward VIII's renunciation of the throne. ## Regarding The Play...

#### **Points of Interest**

Before marrying Prince George of Wales in 1893, Princess Victoria Mary of Teck was first engaged to Prince Albert Edward, Duke of Clarence, (eldest son of King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra) who in 1892, at the age of 28, caught pneumonia and died suddenly at Sandringham only one month before their proposed wedding.

#### Definition of a "MORGANATIC MARRIAGE"

"A form of marriage properly peculiar to the German peoples, but also found in the royal families of other European countries. It is one in which the contracting parties are not, by birth, of equal status or rank ("ebenburtig"), and under which the wife, if not ebenburtig, does not take the rank of her husband, and the children, whether it be the wife or husband that is of lower rank, have no right of succession to the dignities, fiefs or entailed property of the parent of higher rank. Such marriages are recognized as fully binding by the Church, and the children are legitimate, and no other marriage can take place during the lifetime of the contracting parties."

To her son David, on the question of him marrying Wallis Simpson, Queen Mary is quoted, in the play, as saying...

"Not one bishop will attend your Coronation, but I daresay you will be able to persuade some renegade clergyman to marry you..."

In reality, great difficulty was experienced in getting a Church of England clergyman to agree to marry the Duke and Duchess of Windsor in France, because of her previous divorces. Eventually, Rev. Robert Anderson Jardine a Vicar from Darlington in County Durham, was found less than one week before the wedding date, and agreed to perform the ceremony. He was noted in the press later "to be something of an exhibitionist and a lover of publicity"!

Throughout the Duke of Windsor's life in exile, despite his continuous appeals to both the Government and the Royal Family, for his wife, the Duchess of Windsor, to be granted the right to be called Her Royal Highness, this honour was never bestowed.

Queen Mary was never to meet or receive Wallis Simpson after her marriage to the Duke of Windsor, up to her death in 1953.

Apparently Matthew was perfect for this part, all he had to do was lose weight, get a tan, dye his hair, stop biting his nails and aquire a cut glass accent. He is beginning to thing that Robin only wanted him for his ability to teach people how to curtsy!



#### Trudi Hirsch The Princess Royal (Mary)
