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
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Director's Notes



It's perfectly obvious why *The Dresser* is a play that fascinates those of us who spend our lives, as amateurs or professionals, enthralled by the Stage.

The Guardian's theatre critic, Michael Billington said of it: "The Dresser is a wonderfully affectionate play about the theatre. It captures not only the equivocal relationship between Sir and the dresser but also the feeling that the back-stage world is itself a little kingdom, a tatty Camelot worshipping a prop Holy Grail".

Therein lies its fascination! It explains why the cast and I have felt the challenge, so keenly, of bringing the text to life. Again, our colleagues in the various aspects of the production team - costume, sound, properties, lighting, set design and construction - have all been inspired by the challenge of creating 'the backstage world' of this provincial theatre in wartime Britain.

So may we invite you through the Stage Door to our "tatty Camelot", and back in time to those highly charged days of the Blitz - to see for yourselves.

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
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


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Ronald Harwood



Born in South Africa in 1934, Ronald Harwood moved to London in 1951 to pursue a career in the Theatre. After attending the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts, he joined the Shakespeare Company of Sir Donald Wolfit, one of the last "actor-managers" of Great Britain.

From 1953 to 1958, Harwood became the personal dresser of Sir Donald. he would later draw from this experience to write this evening's play. He also wrote a biography of the great man (published in 1971) entitled "Sir Donald Wolfit CBE: His life and work in the Unfashionable Theatre."

In 1960 he was to take up writing as his main career and proved prolific in penning plays, novels and non-fiction books. One of the recurring themes of his work was a fascination for the stage, its artists and artisans as displayed in *The Dresser, After the Lions* (about Sarah Bernhardt), *Another Time* (about a gifted piano player) and *Quartet* (about retired opera singers) - all productions which the Southport Dramatic Club have had pleasure in performing over the years. Harwood also has a strong interest in the World War II period as highlighted by the films *Operation Daybreak*, *Taking Sides* and *The Pianist* (for which he received an Oscar for "Best Adapted Screenplay" in 2003).

Made fellow of the Royal Society of Literature in 1974 and Commander of the British Empire in 1999, Harwood was president of the International PEN Club from 1993 to 1997 after presiding over the British section during the four previous years.


His comedy, *Quartet* performed at the Albery Theatre in 1999, was nominated for a Laurence Olivier Theatre Award in 2000 for "Best New Comedy".

It may be of interest to know, that after a successful pre-West End run at the Richmond Theatre, actors, Nicholas Lyndhurst (of Only Fools and Horses) and Julian Glover (who recently played King Lear at the Globe Theatre) are opening in The Dresser at the Duke of York's Theatre on 22nd February, 2005.



THE LITTLE THEATRE DURING THE WAR YEARS

September 1939 - October 1946

As the current production *The Dresser* depicts the evocative and difficult years of keeping the world of theatre going, against great odds, during war-time – it may be of interest to our audiences to know something of the history of our own Little Theatre during these difficult times.

At the outbreak of the Second World War, a great many professional theatres in certain areas were closed, where danger of air attacks was considered by the Government to be too great. Thus, a popular and successful Repertory Company in Sheffield found themselves without a venue to perform in. Their enterprising Producer/Director, Mr. Geoffrey Ost then approached the Executive Committee of the Southport Dramatic Club to see if it might be possible to hire the Little Theatre. After detailed negotiations this was agreed and the Sheffield Repertory Company rented the Little Theatre "for eight weeks, in the first instance, with an option to renew at the end of the period for four weeks at a time, at a rent of 20 pounds per week." They were to stay for seven years!

The Company reached Southport on Saturday, 16th September and after a week's rehearsal, opened with "Laburnam Grove" on the 25th September, 1939. Although praised by the critics, attendance was poor. Apparently Southport, used to monthly productions by the dramatic club, was not yet ready for weekly rep! In the first two months the company lost £800 and were seriously considering withdrawing from the project. Fortunately, the tide turned – a large influx of war-time government departments were moved to Southport bringing with them a new potential audience – and thus began seven years of continuous and highly successful repertory theatre at "The Little". After 240 different plays were performed – the final production You Can't Take It with You took place on 12th October, 1946.

Many famous people played for the Sheffield Repertory Company including Lally Bowers, Jessica Dunning, Joan Knowles, Cyril Luckham and Lester Barrett. They became well-known to Southport audiences and later more widely known following their appearances on the London stage, and in film and television.

Much later when renovations were completed, nine months after the tragic New Year's Day fire of 1988, we were delighted to invite Cyril Luckham and his wife, Lally Bowers, to a Grand Gala Evening to officially re-open the theatre for us. It was a night to remember, made particularly special by the wonderful reminiscences and stories told by Mr. Luckham of his experiences and happy times spent in Southport, with amusing references to food rationing, lack of transport, clothes coupons and the wonderful camaraderie during the war years, when playing with the Sheffield Repertory Company.

Grateful acknowledgement goes to Mr. Benny Darrah for information given in his book "A History of the Southport Dramatic Club, and its Little Theatre, 1913-1997".

SDC PRODUCTIONS IN THE WAR YEARS

From the opening of the Theatre, on 30th September 1937, until the Sheffield Rep. left, in October 1946, the Southport Dramatic Club presented 20 plays. During the war years, in addition to *Ladies in Retirement* (see photograph below), other presentations were *Suspect*, *Gaslight*, and several one-act plays.


David Charters Geoffrey Thornton

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
